**FR DAVID'S GOSPEL REFLECTION:** The parable in Luke's Gospel begins with a contrast of two characters. One character is a very wealthy man who dresses well, eats well and lives in a nice house. The other character is a very poor man named Lazarus (whose name means 'God helps'). He is sickly, a beggar who camps out at the door of the rich man's house. The rich man seems unaware of Lazarus's existence. Both men die. And when they die their situations are reversed. Only then does the rich man recognise the poor man's existence. Only then does he want to do something. But then it is too late. The second part of the parable is a dialogue between the rich man and Abraham. When the rich man asks that Lazarus be sent to give him some water, Abraham tells him that now it is too late, since there is no going back and forth after death. During life the rich man took no account of poor people like Lazarus. Now it is too late. One of Luke's goals in writing his gospel was to encourage the rich Christians in his community to attend to the needs of the poor members and share their material goods with them. One can easily imagine the impact that this parable would have had on the rich members. It is both a sobering warning and a good scare. It should do the same to twenty-first-century Christians.
